The sample size was not calculated *a priori*. Given our substantial experience with the mouse MTLE model and corresponding analysis techniques, we estimated an appropriate sample size according to our previous studies (e.g. Häussler et al., *Cereb Cortex*, 2012; Häussler et al., *Hippocampus*, 2016; Janz et al., *Cereb Cortex*, 2017a; Janz et al., *eLife*, 2017b).

### **Replicates**
