We applied a post-hoc power analysis, shown in Figure 3-table supplement 1. The calculation method was described in *Methods* (*Post-hoc effect size calculation*). Furthermore, the current study relied on a neural marker established in previous studies, i.e., a 1-Hz neural response entrained to superordinate sequence structure, and the sample size was chosen to be slightly larger than previous studies (16 participants in the current study, compared to 8 participants for each MEG experiment in Ding et al., Nature Neurosci 2016 and 14 participants for each EEG experiment in Ding et al., J Neurosci 2018). More importantly, the results are robust and we showed individual results in Figure 3-figure supplement 1.

We applied a within-group design. The two experimental conditions were presented in separate blocks and the order of the two blocks was counterbalanced across participants (described in *Experimental procedures and tasks* section).
