This paper is a re-analysis of survival data using Bayesian inference methods from two published cohorts, Thuong et al. and van Laarhoven et al., both 2017 JID. This is made explicit throughout the paper. All individuals for whom survival data and LTA4H genotyping data were available were used. Since we had no control over the number of available patients, a power analysis is not appropriate.

The methods are described and justified in full detail in the supplementary methods section.

Raw data are presented in an Excel spreadsheet.

This is a Bayesian analysis that generates posterior distributions of probabilities of survival and hazard rates for mortality. Figures show the mean posterior probability of survival or hazard rate respectively, as well as an equi-tailed Bayesian confidence interval (credible interval) at each time point. In addition, probabilities for which of two probabilities of survival (respectively hazard rate) is greater are given for each comparison of subsets of patients. Numbers of patients in each subset are shown in each figure. Frequentist p-values are not appropriate in a Bayesian study.

All this is made clear in Box 3 and is clearly stated in the there-defined abbreviated form in the figure legends throughout the paper.

The issue of multiple comparisons is addressed in Box 1 and in the text referring to it in the penultimate two paragraphs of the Introduction.
